

### South Bay Rod & Gun Club Prospective Range Safety Officer (RSO) Program

#### Join the Range Officer Team - the 7 Step Process:

- 1. You must be 21 years of age or older and be a member of SBR&GC in good standing (dues paid and current).
- 2. Our program starts with your initiative, website request, email, or membership application inquiry.
- 3. Interview with our Chief Range Safety Officer (CRSO).
- 4. Review the Standard Operating Procedure (SOP).
- 5. Complete a short 34 question quiz (all answers are spelled out for you in the SOP)
- 6. Successfully completing three (3) training days at the range under the eye of one of our Lead Range Safety Officers (LRSO).
- 7. Then you are ready for assignment to at least **one <u>duty day a month</u>** on a day that is mutually agreeable.

Upon assignment, you are issued (at club expense) your own Orange Safety Vest, three (3) iron on club patches, a range key, your membership card stamped with the exclusive red "R.S.O." stamp, and a Guest Pass that entitles you to bring <u>one</u> friend/family member to the range and shoot on 2 occasions-free of charge each year (this is a \$60 value). In addition, qualified Range Officers receives 2 free tickets to the Annual Club Picnic/B-B-Q and one free ticket for a chance to win a free gun at the Picnic (for qualified Range Officers only).

As an added benefit our club will pay for your attendance at an NRA Range Safety Officer Certification class and the cost of your bi-annual NRA certification renewal. This certification entitles you to receive and wear the exclusive" NRA Certified Range Safety Officer" patch on your Orange vest.

A special added value is your MEMBERSHIP dues are waived after successful completion of (1) year of service as a Range Officer. That's right, **FREE MEMBERSHIP.** Life member Range Safety Officers receive a membership voucher that can be used for family or friends.

A special added benefit for qualified "<u>Off Duty" Range Officers only</u> is the privilege to open an unused range <u>without</u> an "on duty "range officer present. Just sign in at the main range, show your membership card with the red "R.S.O." stamp and you are good to go shoot.

- T F 17. Personal silhouette targets on the any range cannot be set closer than 50 yards.
- T F 18. Regardless of target used on a rifle range all rounds must be directed to hit the impact area.
- T F 19. No aerial targets may be used on the pistol ranges.
- T F 20. Shot used for trap shooting is limited to #4 or smaller.
- T F 21. The CRSO & his assistants have the primary responsibility for the recruitment, training and assignment of all Range Officers.
- T F 22. Range Officers and Lead Range Officers are appointed by the CRSO.
- T F 23. It is the duty of the Lead Range Officer to supervise all Range Officers on his duty day and to assure a sufficient number of Officers are available for the safe operation of any open range.
- T F 24. All prospective Range Officers must submit the Basic Test and perform a minimum of 3 days training prior to being assigned to a regular duty day.
- T F 25. Match Directors are nominated from among those in a particular discipline to the Board of Directors and must then complete the test and training required of all Range Officers.
- T F 26. All Range Officers and Match Directors must be over 18 years old.
- T F 27. Range Officers may wear an orange or yellow vest while on duty.
- T F 28. RO's may be dropped from the program if they miss more than 2 days without excuse or notice to their LRO or for discipline violations reported to the BOD or the Range Officer Committee.
- T F 29. Range Officers do not have any authority over military, police or private groups with contracted use of various ranges.
- T F 30. Upon arrival at the range for duty it is the responsibility of whoever opens the gate is in charge of the overall range complex until relieved by other duty RO's.
- T F 31. There must be at least one other Range Officer on duty before any secondary ranges are opened.
- T F 32. Prospective RO Trainees may only open ranges with fewer than five shooters.
- T F 33. Reports of a "Ballistic Crack", "Ricochet", "Accident", "Conduct" or "Damage" must immediately be reported to the President, Vice President or CRSO and followed up in writing on the proper form forwarded to the President.
- T F 34. Match Directors have exclusive rights to the use of a range for a scheduled match regardless of number of shooters or time of the match.

# South Bay Rod & Gun Club PRE-ASSIGNMENT TRAINING

(Note: This Pre-Assignment Training form will be presented to each individual LRSO that you conduct training with. (Minimum of 3). They will cover each point and sign/date at bottom. All three must be turned into the CRSO)

Proposed Duty Schedule:

On your initial training days, the Lead Range Safety Officer on duty will guide you through each day (for a total of three days). This will prepare you with the proper procedures of opening and maintaining the Club's ranges in a safe and friendly environment suitable for shooters of all ages and skill levels. After learning the procedures below (and completing your three days of training) you will be qualified on an interim basis as a Range Safety Officer (RSO) for the Club. You will be issued an orange vest, a key to the range and have your membership card stamped with "RSO". You will also be assigned to a regularly scheduled duty day and allowed to attend the next available NRA-RSO class.						
NOTE: Complete one of these forms for each of your three training days.
